NEWS FROM THE HUFF HOUSE

Renovation work is in progress at the Huff House. Work on the house has uncovered details not in evidence during the 2013 Holiday House tour.

Some foundation timbers have been replaced & floors leveled. As a damaged portion of the south foyer wall was being removed where the plaster had separated from the wall, an original 1904 fireplace was discovered. It had been covered over when the coal-fired furnace was installed in the early to middle 1900s.

Stay tuned as the Huff House committee continues renovation & the house reveals more secrets!

BLUNT HOUSE SHEDS SEVERAL THOUSAND POUNDS

It is never too late to shed a few pounds. The 167-year-old Blunt House has lost several thousand pounds due to the expertise of Leonard Brothers Construction of Chatsworth.

The handmade bricks & old mortar of two of the chimneys were disintegrating. The south chimney was sinking from the second floor into the room below. Fingers could easily push through the crumbling mortar. This chimney was removed from the very top down to the first-floor ceiling. The north chimney, which was in better shape, was removed to just below the roof.

Removal of the chimneys, the addition of structural support and two new ceilings necessitates the renovation of the two south bedrooms. The 1988 roof will be replaced by KG&C Roofing.

The house will be closed for a few months but hopefully the old place will now be stable for many years.

To the Wright Hotel

→Mrs. Ruth Young donated a cotton scale & corn sheller from the Coleman Osborn General Store. The store was located in the Center Hill community of Murray County on what is now called Berry Bennett Rd. Operating for most of the 1920s, it was the only such business for several miles in pretty much every direction.

Mr. Osborn was an entrepreneur who did more than just sell grocery items to his customers. He bought cotton from the several small farmers in the area as well as providing a "commercial" corn sheller for their use, charging them a small fee for the service—or more often receiving a portion of the shelled product in exchange.

In August of 1927, Mr. Osborn was murdered inside the small building. Prior to the murder, his wife, Sadie, helped in the store, too. After the death of her husband, Mrs. Osborn's brother, Mr. John Hawkins, helped her with the various operations on the farm and around the store. Eventually he became the owner of cotton scales and a corn sheller from the Osborn Store. After his death in 1968, the family preserved the items. His daughter, Mrs. Ruth Young, donated the items to WMHS.
