CHATSWORTH DEPOT PLANS REPAIRS

Preservation of the Chatsworth Depot began 25 years ago. Today, the Depot is again a busy place. Over 800 people visited in the last year, including the annual Polar Express for kids at Christmas, the free Homegrown Music concerts held this summer, group tours, & a couple of private events. Our collection of historic memorabilia has expanded, & displays have been revamped. One thing is certain: kids and adults alike still love trains!

Kind, faithful donors have come forward to finance the repair & repainting of the caboose as soon as weather permits. Landscaping has been completed. However, the exterior of the depot needs some attention right away! The platform needs immediate repairs while the trim & walls desperately need a new coat of L & N paint. HISTORY CAMP WAS BIG SUCCESS!

Murray on my Mind, Jr. got underway on Tues., July 26 at the old Spring Place Methodist Church. We began with six students, plus Tim & assistant Andrew Bowen, a teacher at Murray County High. The day was spent in Spring Place, the oldest town in the county. The aroup visited the springs which give the town its name & the site of the Moravian Mission--the first area to be named Springplace. The group also learned that while in the beginning it was spelled as one word, ever since Spring Place was designated the county seat for Murray County, the correct spelling has been as two words!

Other visits the first day were to God's Acre where Charles Hicks, principal chief of the Cherokee Nation, is buried; Treadwell Cemetery, where a couple of unusual grave markers captured attention; & to the Spring Place Cemetery where the group visited the grave of Murray County's Unknown Soldier as well as other interesting interments. The rest of the day was spent at the Vann House where the students enjoyed a Cherokee stickball competition other hands-on demonstrations.

On Wednesday, the group (whose enrollment had increased) traveled around the county & learned about Murray County's connection to the Kennedy Assassination, a 1920s murder that put Murray County in the national news, toured Eton, & had an extended visit to the old Cisco School, one of the

last two-room school buildings left in Murray County. Dr. Becky Whaley told what school was like "back in the day," read them a poem, & taught them songs that she had sung when a student at Cisco.

The last day of class was spent in Chatsworth where train "conductor" Ted Yarbrough led the group through the old Depot--Chatsworth's oldest building. Jan McNeill & C.L. Dunn gave a tour of the Wright Hotel, & court clerk Donna Flood hosted a visit to the Murray County Courthouse & Probate Court (Old Jail). The group also enjoyed homemade ice cream compliments of Mike & Linda LaChapelle, new WMHS members.

Thanks to all who helped with the camp & to NGEMC for a grant that offset costs of the camp.

CAMP HERITAGE EXPLORES WHITFIELD COUNTY

The campers began their first day at the archives and traveled by bus to the Blunt House where they were greeted by Joanne Lewis, Sherrian Hall, & Jean Manly. The campers were divided into three groups & went on a scavenger hunt throughout the house. Marvin Lewis helped with activities. Mr. Blunt, portrayed by Todd Callaway, talked with the campers about early Dalton.

Campers next stop was the Huff House on Selvidge St. where they enjoyed a picnic lunch on the grounds. Conductor Bill Bowen greeted the campers in the train room with an emphasis on the Great Locomotive Chase. Marvin Sowder gave the campers some of the beginning history of the Huff House & some of its secrets. Gen. Joseph E. Johnson, portrayed by Jenkins, shared Civil War Bob Mary Hardin & Marvin information.

Sowder talked about the spirits of the house. Paula S. Hall shared information about the Huff family. The campers returned to the archives for an evaluation session. Vallarie Pratt, executive director, traveled with the campers each day.

On day two the campers loaded the bus & left the Archives for a driving tour of a few Civil War sites in Dalton. They traveled to Dug Gap Mountain Park where Marvin Sowder was the guide. After lunch the group went to West Hill Cemetery to tour the Confederate Cemetery & other special sites. Campers returned to the Archives to cool off & evaluate their day. Vallarie Pratt guided the campers through the evaluation.

Day three began with an outside tour of the archives. Judy Alderman discussed a sculpture by Pete Sims. Marvin Sowder talked about the spring & Red Bird. The campers then participated in a scavenger hunt in the archives with Pratt & Austin Fariss. Campers then walked to the Hamilton House & were greeted by Bruce Davies who shared the history of the house. Jerry Trollinger talked to the campers about the Civil War items on display. Randy Beckler shared information about early tufting & chenille industry. Marvin Sowder led the students to explore the carriage house & Hamilton cemetery. After lunch Virgelia Meek talked with the campers about George Washington & Washington the George brooch. Nellena Smith, camp coordinator, talked with the campers about genealogy. Some of the campers had brought their families' genealogy to share. Several campers are interested in a genealogy workshop. The campers gave some excellent suggestions for the camp for 2017.

Each camper received a notebook with historical information about the sites they visited & a certificate of participation. The WMHS wishes to thank the North Georgia Electrical Membership Cooperation for the Roundup Grant that helped with the expenses of offering this program for the campers.

The 19th question appeared in the July newsletter: What were the mascot and colors of the Chatsworth High School? ANSWER: The Chiefs and green and white--that's why Murray High became the Indians with green and white as their colors still! Chatsworth High was consolidated with Lucy Hill and Eton High Schools to make MCHS in 1934.

Here's question 20: What famous Georgian was born in Dalton & went on to become a successful Atlanta businessman & civic leader & who also donated Fort Mountain for a State Park? (He also helped save the Vann House in the 1950s.)

Fundraiser/Flea Market at Old Spring Place Church

A fundraiser/flea market is set for Sat., Sept. 17, 8:00-1:00 at the Old Spring Place Methodist Church, a property of the Whitfield-Murray Historical Society. All proceeds will go to the continued preservation of the old church, built in 1875. It is the oldest building in Murray County today that was designed for public use.

The main room of the restored structure will be devoted to a flea market that has lots of tapes & records, many collectibles, glasssware, linens, household items, Christmas decorations, & toys. Also available are a large number of Georgia Bulldogs souvenir items!

The fundraising event also features a used book sale that includes lots of paperbacks, children's books, & hardback fiction at really good pricespaperbacks are 5 for \$1 while hardbacks are \$1 EACH. Various historical society publications will also be available for purchase & include postcards, books, DVDs, notecards, maps. & prints.
